

#### MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR GENERAL AFPI

By all accounts this has been an unusual year for us at AFPI. The grim shadow of Covid 19 loomed large over our training activities as Government orders were received in March 2020 to shut down all training institutes and schools due to increasing numbers of Covid patients in the state. Clearly the situation demanded a speedy reorientation in our normal system of training. Full marks to the faculty and to the cadets who responded splendidly to the challenge and in no time at all we had a system of onling classes and lectures in place.



Ninjas of the Ninth Course were primarily focused on completion of CBSC syllabus (mercifully truncated by the Board) and preparation for the NDA entrance exam. The course performed extremely well in the exam and achieved a record result. The Tenacious Tenth were put through online lectures towards personality development and communication skills. Where the cadets suffered tremendously was in the fields of physical fitness, games, debates, becturretes and intersense ports.

Selection of cadets for the Eleventh Course (Pouble First) has been completed. The course is expected to commence in May.

We received some very good news from our young officers. Capt Vishavdeep Singh, 9 PARA CDO, received a Sena Medal for gallantry in J&K. Vishav was with us in the first Course. He was commissioned into 17 RAJ RIF (Sawai Man) but later opted for Special Forces. This is our first gallantry award. Lt Jasmeet Singh Bamrah (3<sup>rd</sup> Course), 14 JAK RIF did extremely well in active operations in Galwan Valley and was awarded Chief of Defence Staff Commendation Card. Lt Chetan Thakur (3<sup>rd</sup> Course), 151 AD Regiment has got a DISTINCTION on his Young Officers Course which is an extremely rare honour. Capt Danish Chadha (1<sup>st</sup> Course), Armoured Corps has stood third on his Automotive Course at Ahmednagar and got an Instructor grading. Well done Afpians. Reep the flag flying high.

In the last one year 25 cadets succeeded in joining NDA and other service academies. With that we now have 162 names in the Achiever's Gallery and 69 young men have been commissioned into the armed forces.

#### HISTORICAL RECORD

#### 01 APR 2020 TO 30 APR 2021

In many ways this year has been most unusual and challenging. The grim shadow of Covid 19 loomed large over our efforts to prepare the cadets for the NDA entrance exam and SSB. We were forced to resort to innovative methods of training to ensure that our cadets do not suffer. In the process we met with several successes and also experienced some failures.

We commenced the year with a lot of expectations and plans. Charlie Sqn had just been created from within the existing number of cadets. The aim was to provide greater leadership opportunities, ensure better control and monitoring by cadets, greater participation in inter sqn events and ease of supervision by Sqn Cdrs. Things did not go as planned. Since the cadets were at home due to Covid 19, none of these aims could be achieved. The experiment will continue and we look forward to better progress in the coming year.

Tenth Course (Tenacious Tenth) was scheduled to join us in April. This could not physically happen. The course joined online and commenced training in May. We have 51 cadets in this course.

Shemrock Sr Secy School conducted online classes for cadets of both courses. These were fairly effective. A problem faced by us was that at times the attendance of such classes tended to drop and a little pep talk was often necessary to ensure that the desired degree of interest and attendance was maintained. All in all these efforts were fairly successful and in fact the school was able to finish the syllabus of the respective classes well in time. In so doing they were facilitated to some extent by the fact that CBSE had reduced the syllabus of Class 12 to cater for interruptions to normal classes due to Covid 19.

IMPACT classes were also conducted online. The teachers and cadets worked extremely hard and preparations for the NDA entrance exam were completed well in time.

138 NDA Course passed out from NDA on 30 May. A formal passing out parade could not be held and an abridged programme was conducted in Habibulah Hall instead. We had 18 cadets in the passing out course. ACA Loveneet Singh and SCC Arunav Laroiya won medals for leadership. BCC Rajdeep Singh also did extremely well and passed out high in the order of merit. All these young men are from our 5<sup>th</sup> Course. Unfortunately for them they were not given any leave after the passing out parade and had to report to their service academies forthwith.

Passing out Parade at IMA Dehra Dun was held on 13 June. Five cadets from the 4th AFPI Course were commissioned as officers

More good news came from the Indian Naval Academy as Sub Lt Manjot Singh and Sub Lt Abhishek Tiwari were commissioned in the Indian Navy.

CBSE Class 12 results were announced in Jul. 8<sup>th</sup> Course has done extremely well. We have four cadets who have secured over 90% marks – Anshdeep ((95%), Bharat Sharma ((93.4%), Karanpreet Singh Gill (91.4%) and Tushant (90.4%).

In Aug we were delighted to learn that our ex Cdt Jaideep Amitoj Singh Vasu has been selected to join Air Force Academy (Course No 207 SSC).

Since the cdts were not physically present during the year, we could not conduct the normal inter sqn events in sports, debates and lecturrettes. The other adverse impact on training was that the traditional guest lectures had to be minimized. Only a few lectures were held in the online mode.

The NDA entrance exam for NDA 145 which was scheduled to be held on 19 April 2020 was postponed due to Covid. A combined exam was held on 06 Sep for both NDA 145 and 146. For NDA 145 we had the left over cadets of the 8th Course taking their second attempt and all cadets of the 9th Course appeared in the exam for NDA 146. Results were announced on 9 Oct. We were very pleasantly surprised to see that 20 cadets had cleared the entrance exam for NDA 145 and 30 cadets out of 39 (9th Course) had cleared the exam for NDA 146. The fact that so many cadets have cleared the entrance exam is a tribute to the hard work put in by the cadets and the IMPACT teachers. They have not allowed the Covid restrictions to deter them and this has been one of our best ever results so far.

For SSB training we resorted to the practice of short capsules with limited number of Cdts in attendance. These capsules were conducted in Nov, Dec and Jan.

Passing out Parade was held at IMA, Dehradun on 12 Dec. Cdt Yashasvi Sharma has been commissioned as a Lt and will be joining a famous cavalry regiment, 3<sup>rd</sup> Cavalry. Also in Dec, our ex Cdt Daljinder Singh (3<sup>rd</sup> Course) was commissioned into the Indian Air Force in the rank of Flying Officer.

On 17 Dec, Director took part in a programme aired live on All India Radio Patiala to motivate the youth to join the armed forces.

Col HS Randhawa, our new GTO joined duty on 01 Jan. He is an experienced GTO who while in service was in the Artillery. We wish him a very successful and rewarding tenure at AFPI.

Cdt Manmeet Singh joined AFA as part of 209 AFA Course in Jan 2021.

The entrance exam for 11<sup>th</sup> AFPI Course was scheduled to be held on 17 Jan. However due to the fact that CBSE has postponed the Board exams this year we too postponed our entrance exam to Mar.

Class 11 final exam results were announced by the school on 08 Feb. All cadets have done well and have been promoted to Class 12. The new session started in online mode with effect from 15 Feb.

On 01 Mar Sub Maj Balkar Singh, our Accounts Clerk retired from service. He has been handling accounts since Jul 2011. His absence will be greatly missed.

Paper evaluation of the 11<sup>th</sup> Course entrance exam was done in MVH on 12 Dec and results announced. The top 151 candidates were being invited for interviews for 42 available seats. This year we conducted interviews in ten batches of 15 candidates per batch to prevent overcrowding and enforce social distancing norms as mandated by Covid restrictions. Interviews were conducted during the period 07 to 22 Apr and 72 candidates were short listed for the medical examination at Sohana Hospital. Final merit list will be prepared in May after all the review medicals are over. We hope to commence the course in the online mode in May.

On 20 Mar orders were received from the govt to shut down all schools and institutes once again due to alarming rise in number of Covid cases. Yet another unfortunate interruption in the training but we shall cope as best as we can and revert to the online classes mode.

Ninth Course completed their practical exams in Mar and are on study leave to prepare for the board exams.

Air Cmde Nitin Sathe joined the AFPI faculty as an Interviewing Officer on 25 Apr. He will be looking after Charlie Sqn as also the Cadet Training Wing programme which we hope will be kick started after a long wait of four years. The officer is an experienced Helicopter pilot and has been the President of Air Force Selection Board, Dehradun. He is also the author of several books.

In the normal course we would have conducted the Achiever Awards function in Dec 2020. This could not be held due to Covid and as such the awards to cadets of 8<sup>th</sup> Course are still pending. Awards were finalized in a conference held in Mar as follows:-

Five cadets of the 8<sup>th</sup> Course joined NDA in April as part of the 145<sup>th</sup> Course. This course was scheduled to commence in Jan but was delayed due to Covid. Total number of Achievers from the first eight courses is now 162. Of these, 69 have been commissioned in the armed forces so far and the rest are under training in various academies.

We sign off this newsletter on 30 April in the fond hope that Covid will recede in the weeks ahead and that we shall be in a position to resume normal training in the near future. In the meanwhile the catch words are – Stay healthy, Stay safe.

#### **FARM LAWS AT TIMES OF LOSS**

Agriculture is a part of state list, which means that only state government has the power to make laws relating to agriculture but central government intervened and made the three contentious farm laws without even consulting farmers or farm leaders. This unprecedented move was made by government when Covid was at its peak and due to the pandemic there was a huge downfall of the economy, In addition to this, INDIA-CHINA standoffs were also going on. Instead of focussing on these major issues, central government made these laws which were not even required at that moment. Due to this a state-wide protest turned into a nation-wide protest and led to international recognition too.

The three farm laws and their drawbacks are :-

- 1. FARMERS AGREEMENT OF PRICE ASSURANCE AND FARM SERVICE ACT This act allows corporates to enter into the field of agriculture. History has proven that whenever corporates had entered into the fields like education, health, transportation etc, they had ultimately gained control over the respective field. With entry of them in agriculture, farmers are afraid that they would have get a grasp over it too and will also control the prices of crops.
- 2. FARMERS PRODUCE AND TRADE COMMERCE ACT- With this act government controlled Agriculture Produce Market Committee (APMC) which in layman language is called MANDIS. This will run alongside private Mandis, controlled by private parties. Now farmers fear in this act is that for first few years private Mandis will buy crops at low prices which will help farmers gain profit but with their system of 'OPEN AUCTION', this will leap downwards and they will start luring money from farmers.
- 3. ESSENTIAL COMMODITIES (AMENDMENT)ACT This bill virtually removes food items such as cereals, pulses, onions etc from list of "essential commodities". It also controls the production, supply and distribution of these commodities.
- 4. In 1906, number of infected rats in Vietnam proliferated instantly which led to many casualties, so the Vietnam government apprised people that if they kill a rat, they will get a reward and as a proof they had to show tail of dead rat. Now, irony of the situation is that instead of killing the rat, people only cut the tails with numbers of rats still increasing. Same is the case with Government of India, they are just 'counting the tails'.






Belief. That's what I am going to tell you a story about.

This is a true story about a true person and about a true friend and comrade in arms. I wrote his biography not too long after he flew into the blue skies on the 20<sup>th</sup> of May 2014. (Born to Fly-Vitasta Publishing, New Delhi)

Meet the hot shot MiG-21 pilot- Flying Officer MP Anil Kumar-called 'MP' by all of us.

Just close your eyes and imagine yourself paralyzed neck down and not able do anything yourself. Even if an irritating fly or a mosquito sits on your nose, all you can do is call for help. You have to be fed, be taken to

the loo where someone presses your stomach so that you can relieve yourself, and someone has to turn the page of the book you are reading.



This is what exactly life got to the table for `MP'...my friend and course-mate from the Air Force.

It was a late evening of early August 88 and MP was on his way back from night flying which had been called off due to bad weather. There was lightening, thunder and light rain; and the base was enveloped in darkness due to

the usual power failure. It was difficult to see clearly as rain water kept dribbling down his helmet visor as he rode back home slowly on his bike, his briefcase precariously balanced on his thighs and the fuel tank.

That is when the accident happened. MP drove into an unlighted wooden barrier and was thrown off his bike, his spine fractured. All would have been well if the second accident hadn't happened. The people who rescued him picked him up holding his hands and legs, his neck dangling like a broken flower hanging on to its stem. Due to this, the chipped vertebrae went on to slice through the entire bundle of nerves passing through his neck and the control of the brain over the body was severed forever.

MP was paralyzed neck down for life, forced to spend

the rest of his life in bed or tied to a wheel chair. 'What is the point in living when I can't even swat a fly sitting on my nose! I don't want to be a burden on anyone, I hope to die soonest,' he said to his friends as he was recovering in hospital.

Soldiers in the armed forces are trained in the finest institutions in the world and our warriors are taught never to give up. And, MP never gave up; despite the crushing blow to his life. He wove for himself a meaningful second life, and in doing so, became an inspiration for many.

Bound as he was to his wheelchair, his mind was boundless and he courageously conquered the world. There is no one, repeat, **no one**, who met MP and did not come out feeling good. He lifted your spirits, showed you the way and told you that there was light at the end of the tunnel.

I, for one, do believe that MP was the epitome of 'self-belief' and called him the Stephen Hawking of India.

Whilst researching for my book, countless people sought me out, sharing with me their memorable MP stories. These were stories of individuals who were defeated by life, but whom MP brought back from the precipice of despair. And that, I believe, is what makes MP the unique human being he was.

For the next 26 years, more than half his life, MP lived at the Armed Forces Paraplegic Rehabilitation Centre (PRC) in Pune tied to the bed or his wheel chair. Much as we take heart from MP's zeal for life, it was anything but easy.

At 24, he had to relearn to live. He learnt to write with his mouth and then went on to operate the computer with a pencil held in between his teeth.

This 'connect' with the outside world became a turning point in his life.

He wrote the first mouth written essay 'Airborne to Chairborne' which became part of the Maharashtra and Kerala government text books. So powerful was this



essay that he became a celebrity, and children, teachers and many more people from all over thronged to see this wonder man. With this increase in human contact, MP's will to live got a boost. He became a confidante for a large number of people who came to him for advice.

Over the years, during my numerous meetings with him, I constantly prodded him to write his memoirs. He would always say, 'I am no great man, there are so many disabled soldiers out there who have been injured while actively engaging the enemy and are doing so well-they are the ones to be written about.'

He always underplayed his own transformation and central role in transforming lives of countless others.

After his passing in 2014, something inside me told me that I must write his biography. With encouragement from his family and numerous friends-especially mates from the Sainik School Kazhakootam, I went on to write his amazing story.

MP passed away on May 20, 2014, 15 days after his 50<sup>th</sup> birthday.

In 1988, the doctors had given up on him and said that it would be a matter of time before MP was claimed by the almighty. But MP defied all odds, as he did so often in the 26 years after the horrific accident.

As his body moved into the electric furnace, I almost heard MP say, 'Come on guys, it's only my body that's gone, my spirit will live on forever...don't weep or grieve over me....move on...And like our Air Force motto, "Touch the Sky with Glory"!

The furnace reminded me of the reheat on Anil's MiG-21. He was finally rolling down the runway for his take off.

He flew into eternity, leaving indelible imprints on many hearts and many minds.

Flying Officer MP Anil Kumar proved to all of us that where there is a will, ways will open up. He truly defined the word BELIEF, didn't he?

MP was truly BORN TO FLY.

(This essay is a tribute to MP Anil Kumar on his 7<sup>th</sup> death anniversary. I also salute the unnamed soldier who gets incapacitated for life in the line of duty and proves to the world that if you have belief in yourself, then-The Sky is the Limit!)

### DEEP

DEEP-DEEP.... the word buzzes my thinking system. What can one write on this word, I wonder?

So deep rooted is the military in my brain and blood that *any* word prompt takes me into past life immediately. So read if you must and read if you wish to fall into the deep! (Not Sleep!)

So, here is my story about the deep...

### THE PUSH INTO THE 'DEEP'

From up above, one can see the maze of green and brown play fields shrouded under the haze

of city smoke. The red stone of Sudan block and the silver dome of the science block with its big clock ticking away time are ominous.

We don't have all that much time to think from up there. If we did, we may have admired the scene. The dark blue water at the deep end of the pool beckons.

At the Ustaad's whistle, all of us young cadets stand in our maroon trunks, our thin legs shaking (because of the cold shower, we like to think) and ascend the 50 odd steps to the concrete ledge 35 feet above the centre of the deep end of the pool.



Wonder if the others are also trying to focus on the lunch at the other side of this ordeal.

The instructor has forbidden us to look down into the water. We do so anyway, with prayer on our lips. The pool looks like a blue postage stamp on a brown and green camouflage envelope. The deep end seems unfathomable even to the sunlight trying to pierce its way into its depths. But all the sun succeeds in, is a golden shimmer on the gentle waves of the water.

The adrenalin kicks in and our heart accelerates like an aircraft at full power for takeoff. The ramp is our runway for the moment. There is no running back now. The only way down is by taking the final leap into the deep.

The Robert Frost poem which we have just been through in our English class comes to my mind...and my brain modifies it even in the panic... "The water is cold, dark and deep...but I have to leap; because I have promises to keep, and there's still time to go before I sleep!"

One step off the board and we are off - lips pursed, eyes closed.

The stomach churns, the eyeballs go up into their upward stops, the lungs contract as if squeezing out the life in us. Hands and legs go into a grotesque dance as if trying to hold on to thin air to stop the fall. But gravity won't have any of this; it accelerates us downwards in the few seconds that we are airborne.

And then, in the moment that once stood at the end of eternity, the deep gobbles us in a thunderous splash. There is a slap of the water hitting our chests or back sides and we go down under with a whoosh, our breath escaping in bubbles that sound loudly and continuously in our ears. We gasp for air, water finds its way into our bodies, into crevices, orifices. We sputter for breath, hands and legs struggling to get to the top of the water world.

Buoyancy now takes over; and we find ourselves propelled upwards to the sunny side of the pool- it is as if god has finally heard our prayers and is guiding us back to life. Our head pops out of the water and we try to orientate ourselves after the crash. Soon, we thrash our hands and legs and get to the edge of the pool and out of it.

We are alive! Yet another jump is over!

Whether you were a swimmer or not, it was mandatory for cadets to jump from this height at the National Defence Academy (although in the junior terms, we jumped from a little lower 7 meters!) The idea was to see if the young men had the mental courage it took to join the military. Even if this courage was less in magnitude in the early years, this jump into the deep and many such 'mad' activities at the academy made sure that the latent steel within us surfaced in good measure at the end of our training.

There are so many incidents at the pool that bring a smile on our faces even now. One such incident is about Cadet 'GP'. The boy was good at everything else but hated the pool and its water. For many of us, the first jump was a waterloo-as it was for GP. Allow me to narrate this incident in the beautiful words of my friend MP which I have recorded in my book Born to Fly.

"Despite numerous commands given from below by the Divisional Officer Flt Lt Mishra, GP kept on holding to the railings on the side of the approach to the diving board. No amount of cajoling would make his grip loosen; and Nijjar- the ustaad- realised that it would be impossible to unlock the white knuckles of the boy to dislodge him from the top. Now, one 5<sup>th</sup> termer, Cadet Aggarwal, was sent to bolster the efforts to get GP to jump. A minor scuffle ensued and the boys below waited for the frail GP to now come down flying.

Nothing of that sort happened. GP's perseverance won, and he soon managed to edge both his assailants to a drop into the pool! Aided by some un-understood law of prehensility, our man clung on to the railing, his legs dangling, a la Spiderman in his swimming costume. He then summoned energy from somewhere to do a toilsome pull-up and get back on to the 7 meter board, and majestically stood there unvanquished'.

GP would have been relegated or sent home if he hadn't jumped. Eventually, jump he did; and to top it all, went on to join the Indian Navy!

In life, one requires the gentle push to go into the deep. Once you have crossed this threshold, you now discover the ways to get to the top. You then realise that you have the strength to fight adversity, come what may.

And then, later on in life, one continues to look for new depths that one would want to jump into, to conquer...but this time more confidently. We had just conquered the seemingly impossible. Jumping from 35 feet only in your chaddi's requires B.... and sometimes a push!

### REMINISCENCES: PREAMBLE LEADING TO THE SECOND INNINGS



While I was posted as GI Training (MATT) at 2 STC Panaji, Goa, sometime in Apr 1992, my Senior Instructor called me to say that there was a signal from MS Branch detailing me to TO's course. Initially I thought that perhaps it was the GTO's (Group Testing Officer's) course and there could have been an error, that probably 'G' could have been erroneously missed out, however on query, it was learnt that the signal was correct, as TO meant "Technical Officer" i.e., Psychologist's course. As SSB tenure is considered prestigious, being equivalent to an Instructor Class "A" Training Establishment, it was decided by Signal Training Centre to send me on the course.

At that juncture, all I could think was that my glorious tenure of the Sun-n-Sand and attractive beaches of Goa would soon be coming to an end, however I could never have imagined that this **DIPR course** would enable a **second career** after retirement.

I vividly recall the first day at Defence Institute of Psychological Research(DIPR) when the **Director**, **Dr W Selvamurthy**, in his inaugural address queried to know as to how many of us were "MA Psychology", perhaps because, the system of inducting Officers from all arms as Psychologists had just been initiated. On hearing a negative response, he appeared astonished, wondering as to how "MS Branch" had nominated Officers for such a course!!!

We were issued a pile of books with the curriculum and exam schedule with just three months to learn psychology. This included the norms and nuances of assessment & personality evaluation, so we were left with no option but to slog to avoid failure and being "**Returned to Unit"** (**RTU**).

Those of us who cleared the theory leg were despatched to report to various selection Centres (SSBs) for the practical leg of another three months. At SSBs, the performance of the trainee is closely monitored for live assessment of cadets which is.

then matched with that of the Instructor. **Consistency in assessment** is a vital factor and **variation soften resulted in being weeded out** even though having reached to the second leg of the course.

I had **two tenures** as a **Psychologist**, one at **34 SSB** (Selection Centre East Allahabad) from 1993 - 1996 and **second tenure** at **Selection Centre Central Bhopal** from 2010 – 2011, as a re-employed Brigin the capacity of Senior Psychologist and Call up Officer.

During these SSB tenures, I had the opportunity to **assess over 2400** candidates of which a sizable number are officers today.

During my tenure at MCTE as Cdr Faculty of Combat Communications (**FCC**), I often conducted **SSB coaching classes** on Sundays and holidays for **JCOs/OR**, who had call letters to **face SSBs**.

Officers from technical arms have more opportunities and options of serving with MNCs in the field of IT as **second innings** after superannuation, but my exposure and experience in personality assessment and SSB training sparked **a strong passion** to help youth in the induction to armed forces as officers, so I dropped the idea of joining an IT Firm.

In **Apr – May 2013**, the Punjab Govt advertised to fill up a vacancy of an DIPR trained/experienced Psychologist, for employment with Maharaja Ranjit Singh Armed Forces Preparatory Institute. I applied and was selected to join the Institute with effect from **09 Jul 2013**, during this tenure up to **18 DEC 2019** (six and a half years), during this period, I had the opportunity to train approx. **330 cadets from 2<sup>nd</sup> course to the 8<sup>th</sup> course.** 

I wish to mention here that besides my duties primarily as a **Psychologist** at Maharaja Ranjit Singh- AFPI, I was also assigned and additional responsibility as "officer in charge academics" for cadets studying at **Shemrock**. This entailed multiple tasks of monitoring the academic performance of cadets, review of curriculums to adjust AFPI training requirements, monitoring of coverage of syllabi, arranging **Academic Conferences between the School and AFPI** authorities to review progress and iron out anomalies, if any as also maintaining liaison and a close coordination with the school.

This was altogether a **new experience**, it was a treat to solve many challenging problems including naughty pranks of cadets, one of the perpetual complaints from School was of cadets dozing off in classes, then, making lame excuses that they were always short of sleep due rigors of training **at AFPI**, at times there were also typical problems like **altercations** between other "**Shemrockites and AFPIans**" over games, and other **adolescent issues**. Thus, there was never a dull moment.

It was interesting to study the **psyche of the cadets**, to apprise them of their weaknesses and emphasis to build strong fundamentals for success in life, inculcating **squadron spirit** to win the coveted "**Champions Trophy**" and allied prizes, motivating and guiding them through various competitions(sports, cross country, debates), including organising their squash and tennis championships was fun, as I always **felt younger** being with them and at times even challenged the squash winner. I enjoyed my tenure grooming the cadets, in their personality development and SSB training, so that they excel in their performance at SSBs.

It was a matter of pride and honour that Sh. Prakash Singh Badal, ex CM Punjab, was a frequent visitor to AFPI, he nurtured and cared for AFPI, his unstinted support, deep sense of involvement, magnanimity to sanction funds and ensuring infrastructural maintenance of the Institute was a great morale booster for AFPI, the

Institute in return worked very hard and produced outstanding results. Soon, MRS AFPI became the **cynosure of Punjab.** MRS AFPI also had the honour of the visit by the **Governor of Punjab, His excellency Sh. Shivraj V Patil, Army Commander (Western Command) and many other VVIPS.**

Ideally, a team of **GTO**, **Psych**, **and an Interviewing officer** is required for imparting personality development and SSB training. As there was no Interviewing Officer, this task was carried out by our team, prior to outsourcing an IO, thus giving each cadet adequate exposure to the technique I am told this long outstanding requirement has now been fulfilled, AFPI now has a dedicated Interviewing Officer, and the team of assessors is complete.

During my tenure, I must say, ours was a very small and a happy team, we worked hard as also relished every moment, of that period, I had the opportunity to work with Maj Gen BS Grewal as Director and **four GTOs in succession** viz Col HS Chauhan, Lt Col SS Rai, and Brig Rajsher Grewal and Lt Col CP Singh.

I consider myself fortunate and lucky to have been a part of the training team, it was and a pleasure and a great learning to have worked with Maj Gen BS Grewal.

It is worth the mention that hearing the success story of Maharaja Ranjit Singh AFPI, the Government of Rajasthan, Himachal Pradesh, and Telangana sent high level delegations to study and replicate the AFPI Model.

Ex AFPI Cdts, Gagandeep Singh Dhami and Jasmehak Singh gave proud moments to AFPI by securing the First position in both Fighter as well as Helicopter Streams, respectively. AFPI ans also topped All India UPSC NDA list twice. One Cdt Gurvansh Gosal won Bronze Medal during IMA (POP), held in Dec 2019.

I was initially very reluctant to take up the assignment, Maj Gen BS Grewal motivated me to accept the assignment, moreover MB AFPI did not have a Psychologist and as Gp Capt. A K Srivastava had already joined, so the Govt decided to retain me on the above pretext, and I was side stepped to MB AFPI.

MB AFPI has made a **good start** and is not too far behind, as on date, **8 lady cdts** have already been **commissioned** of which ex **Lady Cdt Tabassum** topped the 'Air **Transporter Stream**' (among men and women), two lady Cdts are under training at OTA, and **11 Lady Cdts** are awaiting merit after clearing SSB.

As MRS AFPI and MB AFPI are sister organisations, **AFPI** has been very close to my heart, I feel happy that I am still remain a **part of AFPI**, and that the **second Innings yet continues**.

It gives me an immense pleasure, satisfaction, and pride, that I was given an opportunity to groom, train and shape the career and future of the youth both men and women of Punjab and to enable their **induction as Officers in the Armed Forces.** 

I pray for many many more laurels and greater moments of glory to both AFPIs.



### MAJOR BHUPINDER SINGH, MVC

Major Bhupinder Singh was bornon 19th Sep 1928 at Rupnagar in Ropar district of Punjab. Son of Shri Sajjan Singh, Maj Bhupinder joined the army after completing his education. He was commissioned into the Hodson's Horse on 11th Dec 1949. By the year 1965, he had been promoted to the rank of Major and had put in over 15 years of service. Major Bhupinder Singh had developed into a committed soldier and gritty officer who always believed in leading from the front. During the 1965 Indo-Pak war, Major Bhupinder Singh's unit got deployed in the Punjab sector.

Indo Pak War: Sep 1965

The battle of Phillora was one of the largest tank battles fought during the Indo-Pak war. It was the first major engagement between the two nations in the Sialkot sector. The battle started on 10<sup>th</sup> September, when Indian troops launched a massive attack in thesector. Its 1<sup>st</sup> Armoured Division was on the offensive in that area. Equipped with four Armoured Regiments, this division faced stiff opposition from the Pakistani 6<sup>th</sup> Armoured Division. Pakistani air attacks did little damage to the tank columns. For the next two days, intense fighting continued and the outnumbered Pakistani troops made a tactical retreat towards Chawinda. By this time, Indian troops had destroyed 67 Pakistani tanks.

During this time Maj Bhupinder Singh was commanding 'Bravo' Squadronof 4 Horse which was deployed to cut the enemy line of along the road Gadgor-Phillora and provide a fire base for attack on Phillora. Major Bhupinder Singh led his squadron with distinction in the battle of Phillora and his squadron was able to cause large-scale destruction of Pakistani tanks and other equipment.

Maj Bhupinder also played a key role in the subsequent battle for Sordreke on 19 Sep. With skillful deployment and bold action, his squadron proved its mettle and changed the course of the battle

in India's favour. Although Maj Bhupinder's tank was hit on several occasions, he continued to remain in effective command and by several acts of personal gallantry, inspired his men to fight courageously. In one of the attack, though his tank was damaged, he bailed out safely and went back to save one of his comrades, which exemplifiedhis courage, sacrifice and comradeship. Ironically, on 19th September which was Major Bhupinder Singh's birthday, his tank was hit and caught fire in which he received severe burn injuries. He was evacuated and shifted to the military hospital atDelhi. Maj Bhupinder later succumbed to his injuries on 3rd October 1965.

For displaying exemplary gallantry, leadership and devotion to duty Major Bhupinder Singh was awarded nation's second highest gallantry award 'MahaVir Chakra" posthumously. When Prime Minister asked why "Tears in such a brave man's eyes", Major replied "Not because of pain, its because my PM is standing before me and I can't even salute him "". The District Authorities of Ludhiana have named the Bharat Nagar Chowk of city as Major Bhupinder Singh Chowk.

### FD MSHL SHF J MANEKSHAW, MC

Field Marshal Sam HormusjiFramji Jamshedji Manekshaw popularly known as "Sam Bahadur" was born on 3<sup>rd</sup>Apr 1914 at Amritsar in Punjab. His parents, Dr HormusjiManekshaw and SmtHeerabai, had moved from the city of Valsad in the coastal Gujarat region. His father also served for the British Army as a medical officer in Mesopotamia during the First World war. FM Manekshaw had three brothers and two sisters and, all them, except the eldest brother, went to 'Sherwood School' in Nainital for studies.

At the age of 15, FM Manekshaw asked his father to send him to London to study medicine as he wanted to become a gynecologist. But his father declined and in an act of defiance, on 1°Oct 1932, FM Manekshaw appeared for the Military Academy entrance examination in Dehradun. He got selected and became part of the first batch of 40 candidates selected for the Military Academy. He got commissioned as second lieutenant in the Frontier Force Regiment in the year 1934. He initially became part of the Royal Scouts and then the 54th Sikh Regiment, which, on partition, became part of the Pakistani Army. After serving for a couple of years, he got married to MsSiloo Bode on 22<sup>nd</sup>Apr 1939 and the couple had two daughters Sherry (born on 11<sup>th</sup> Jan 1940) and Maya (born on 24<sup>th</sup> Sep 1945).

### Military Leader-Par Excellence

Field Marshal Sam Manekshaw achieved a number of firsts throughout his military career and was the first Indian Army officer to be promoted to the rank of Field Marshal. His distinguished military career spanned over four decades and five wars, beginning with the British Indian Army in World War II. He was initially selected into the Indian Military Academy as a part of the first batch of cadets called "The Pioneers". His first major military campaign was in World War II, where he served as a captain with the 4/12 Frontier Force Regiment in Burma in 1942. In Feb 1942, FM Manekshaw displayed his soldierly and leadership skills during the battle of the Sittang Bridge against the Imperial Japanese Army. He launched a forceful counter-attack and engaged the Japanese forces fearlessly. He led his unit to an emphatic victory, despite losing half of his soldiers. His exemplary leadership clinched the militarily significant Sittang Bridge for the Allied forces.

During the counter offensive for the capture of Sittang Bridge, FM Manekshaw was hit by a burst of light machine gun fire and suffered a major injury in his stomach. His exceptional bravery was appreciated by Major General David Cowan, who was the Commander-in-Chief of the 17th Infantry Division. Fearing that FM Manekshaw would succumb to his injuries, the general pinned his own Military Cross ribbon on then CaptManekshaw's chest saying, "A dead person cannot be awarded a

Military Cross". The award was made official when a notification was published in the London Gazette in April 1942. FM Manekshaw was evacuated from the battlefield and taken to an Australian surgeon who treated him. After recovering from the wounds he suffered during the Burma Campaign, FM Manekshaw completed the staff course at Command and Staff College in Quetta and served there for a while as an instructor.

He joined the 12 Frontier Force Rifles in Burma and was wounded in battle again. Towards the end of the war, he was assigned the important task of 'rehabilitation of the 60,000 Japanese POWs (prisoners of war)', which he carried out very successfully. He was highly appreciated for the way he handled the whole process that resulted in no cases of indiscipline or untoward incidents. Later, he served with the Military operation directorate and handled many planning and administrative issues that crept up after partition. He also accompanied Shri VP Menon to Srinagar when the 'Instrument of accession' was signed with Maharaja Hari Singh. He also assisted in the planning of "Op Polo" which was launched in Sep 1948, when peaceful negotiations failed with the Nizam of Hyderabad. FM Manekshaw continued to prove his mettle as a soldier and a military leader in various appointments thereafter, and contributed immensely in fine-tuning the Indian Army into a potent force.


1971 Indo-Pak War: The war was officially declared on 03 Dec 1971, when Pakistani Air Force bombed eleven IAF bases in the western part of our country. Gen Manekshaw, as Chief of Army Staff, formulated an aggressive strategy to fight the war on both Western and Eastern fronts. The war, lasting barely 13 days, saw more than 90,000 Pakistani soldiers being taken as POWs, and it ended with the surrender of Pakistani forces, resulting in the birth of Bangladesh. After the war, FM Manekshaw, as a true soldier, ensured that the POWs were treated with respect as enshrined in the Geneva conventions. He was elevated to the rank of Field Marshal on 1 Jan 1973 and retired from active service on 15 Jan 1973. After his retirement FM Manekshaw went on to head several companies, and running their affairs with the ethos and values he held dear to his heart. He was conferred with multiple awards for his service to the nation including "Padma Vibhushan" and "Padma Bhushan".

Field Marshal Sam Manekshaw, with a string of accomplishments, lived a contended life and left for his heavenly abode on 27 Jun 2008 at the age of 94 years. He was undoubtedly India's greatest soldiers and will continue to inspire future generations for a long time to come.



### MARSHAL OF THE INDIAN AIR FORCE ARJAN SINGH

Marshal of the Indian Air Force Arjan Singh was born on 15 Apr1919, in a military family in Lyallpur, Punjab, of undivided India. His father, grandfather and great grandfather too had served in the Army. Patriotism ran in his family as his father was a Lance Daffedar in the Hodson's Horse at the time of his birth, and retired as a full Risaldar of the Cavalry. His grandfather, Risaldar Major Hukam Singh and great-grandfather, Naib Risaldar Sultana Singh had also served in Army.

MIAF Arjan Singh was selected to the Empire Pilot Training Course (EPTC) at RAF, Cranwell, when he was 19 years old. His first assignment on being commissioned was to fly Westland Wapiti biplanes in the North-Western Frontier Province as a member of the No.1 Royal Indian Air Force Squadron. He was promoted to the rank of Squadron Leader in 1944 and led the squadron against the Japanese during the Arakan Campaign. He also flew close air support missions during the crucial Imphal Campaign and later assisted in the advance of the Allied Forces to Rangoon.

For his role in successfully leading the squadron in combat, then Sqn Ldr Arjan Singh was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) in 1944. After his promotion to the rank of a Wing Commander, he attended the Royal Staff College in Britain. Immediately after Independence, he commanded Ambala Air Force Station in the rank of Group Captain. In 1949, he was promoted to Air Commodore and took over as Air Officer Commanding of an operational command that later came to be known as the Western Air Command.

Air Cmde Arjan Singh had the distinction of having the longest tenure as the AOC of an Operational base, initially from 1949-1952 and then again from 1957-1961. After his promotion to Air Vice Marshal, he was appointed as the AOC-in-C of another Operational Command. Towards the end of the 1962 war, he was appointed as the Deputy Chief of Air Staff and became the Vice Chief in 1963.

On August 1, 1964, in the rank of Air Marshal, he took the reins of the IAF at a time when the force was rebuilding itself and was gearing up to meet new challenges. Arjan Singh was a WWII hero and won our nation's gratitude for his military leadership in 1965 war. He led a young Air Force into the war against Pakistan in 1965 when he was 45. With careful planning, unmatched insight and wisdom, Arjan Singh, outfoxedthe Pakistan Air Force which had the top of line US jets as against India's old Gnats and Vampire fighters. After a few initial setbacks, the Indian Air Force outmaneuvered the Pakistani fighters, handing

a decisive air superiority to the Indian war effort. He remained the IAF chief from August 1, 1964, to July 15, 1969. He was the first Indian Air Chief to be elevated to the rank of Air Chief Marshal on January 16, 1966. He retired from the service in 1970 after a glorious service career at the age of 50.

### Post Retirement Period

After his retirement from the air force, MIAF Arjan Singh was appointed as India's Ambassador to Switzerland in 1971 and concurrently served as the Ambassador to the Vatican. He was also the High Commissioner to Kenya in 1974. He served as a member of the National Commission for Minorities and was also the Lieutenant Governor of Delhi. In recognition of his lifelong services, the government conferred the rank of the "Marshal of the Indian Air Force" on Arjan Singh on 28 Jan 2002, making him the first and the only 'Five Star' rank officer of the Indian Air Force.

The gallant soldier left for his heavenly abode on 16 Sep 2017 at the age of 98, owing to natural causes. MIAF Arjan Singh will go down in the military history of India as one of the greatest soldiers and will continue to inspire future generations.




Captain Gurbachan Singh Salaria, PVC (29 Nov 1935 - 05 De 1961) was a member of the United Nations peacekeeping force in the Democratic Republic of Congo. Singh was an alumnus of King George's Royal Indian Military College and the National Defence Academy. He was the first NDA alumnus and is the only UNPeacekeeper to be awarded a Param Vir Chakra (PVC), India's highest wartime Military decoration.

In December 1961, Salaria was among the Indian troops deployed to the Congo as part of the United Nations Operations. On 05 Dec, Salaria's battalion was tasked to clear a roadblock of two Armoured cars manned by 150 gendarmes of the secessionist State of Katanga on the way to the Elizabethville Airport. The plan was that Salaria and his men were to block their retreat. His rocket launcher team attacked and destroyed the Katangese Armoured cars. This unforeseen move confused the gendarmerie and Salaria felt it would be best to attack before they reorganised. Though his troops were badly outnumbered, they charged towards the Katangese and killed 40 men in a kukri assault. During the attack, Salaria was shot twice in the neck and eventually succumbed to his injuries. The remaining gendarmes fled in utter confusion leaving their dead and wounded behind. This helped the main battalion to easily overrun the Katangese and clear the roadblock. For his duty and courage, and disregard for his own safety during the battle, Salaria was awarded the "Param Vir Chakra".

### FLYING OFFICER NIRMAL JIT SINGH SEKHON, PVC

<u>Flying Officer</u> Nirmal Jit Singh Sekhon, <u>PVC</u> (17 Jul 1943 - 14 Dec 1971) was an officer of the <u>Indian Air Force</u>. He was posthumously awarded the <u>Param Vir Chakra</u>, India's highest Military decoration during war, in recognition of his lone defence of the <u>Srinagar</u> Air Base against a <u>PAF</u> Air Raid during the <u>Indo-Pakistani War of 1971</u>. He is the only member of the Indian Air Force to be honoured with the PVC.

Nirmal Jit Singh Sekhon was born on 17 Jul 1943 ina Jat <u>Sikh</u> family in the village of Isewal, <u>Ludhiana</u>, <u>Punjab Province</u>, <u>British India</u>. He was the son of MWO Honorary Flight Lieutenant Tarlok Singh Sekhon. He was commissioned into the <u>Indian Air Force</u> on 04 Jun 1967.

During the Indo-Pakistani War of 1971, he was serving with the No.18 Squadron, "The Flying Bullets" of IAF, flying the Gnat fighter aircraft based out of Srinagar. On 14 Dec 1971, Srinagar airfield was attacked by six Pakistan Air Force F-86 Jets of 26 Sqn from PAF base Peshawar. Flying Officer Sekhon was on ORP (operational readiness platform) duty at that time. As soon as the first aircraft attacked, Sekhon rolled for take-off as No 2 in a two-Gnat formation, with Flt Lt Ghumman in lead, just as the first bombs were falling on the runway. Only delayed due to dust kicked up by the preceding Gnat, Sekhon lost no time in singling out the first Sabre pair, which was re-forming after the bombing run. The Gnat Leader, Flt Lt Ghuman, lost visual with his wingman just after take-off, remained out of the fight leaving Sekhon to handle the muddle all by himself. In the ensuing air battle, Sekhon scored a direct hit on one Sabre and set another ablaze. The latter was seen heading away towards Rajauri, trailing smoke.

Sekhon, after being hit, was advised to return to the base. He is said to have flown in straight, wings level for some time, then going inverted, plummeting down, probably due failure of aircraft control systems. He attempted a last-minute ejection, which did not prove successful, as his canopy was

seen to fly off. The wreckage of the Gnat was found in a gorg	ge, near the road coming from
Srinagar town to the base, a few miles away from the airport. The bravery, flying skill and determination displayed by Flying	Officer Sekhon, against odds
of 1:6, earned him India's highest wartime medal for gallantry,	the "Param Vir Chakra."

Honorary Captain Karam Singh was born on 15 Sep 1915, at Bhaliawala village in Sangrur district of Punjab. Son of a farmer Sardar Uttam Singh, Karam Singh always wanted to live a life of thrill and adventure since his childhood. His uncle was a JCO in the army and the young boy Karam Singh wanted to follow in his footsteps as he was impressed by the army way of life. He uncle was inducted into the famed Sikh Regiment in Aug 1942 and had proved himself as a good sportsman, making a name for himself in pole vault and long jump disciplines. He also had participated in World War II and proved his mettle as a dedicated and brave soldier.

Military Medal

During World War II, Singh faced Japanese soldiers at the Burma Front in 1945. He fought in the deep jungles of Burma against the formidable force of the Japanese. For his astute bravery and skill, he was awarded the gallantry medal of Britain, the "Military Medal" on 14<sup>th</sup> Mar 1944.

Indo Pak War: Oct 1948

During the J & K operations in the summer of 1948, the Indian Army made substantial gains in the Tithwal sector. Subsequently, on 23<sup>rd</sup>May, they seized control of this sector. The enemy had no choice but to abandon their mission. They were, however, far from letting Tithwal go without a fight. The Battle of Tithwal went on for months with the Pakistani army constantly vying for its capture. They could not, however, make a dent on the Indian defences. The re-capture of Tithwal, with Richmar Gali as a vital objective, became the Pakistan Army's main goal. To achieve this objective, a reinforced Brigade, with artillery, was deployed to encircle the position.

On 13<sup>th</sup>Oct 1948, the Pakistan Army launched an attack with a Brigade strength to evict the Indian Army from their strongly held positions. The attack saw immense fighting in the Richmar Gali region and heavy shelling by guns and mortar. The enemy fire took out the communication lines. During this time, the then Lance Naik Karam Singh was commanding a forward outpost in the area. The enemy troops heavily outnumbered the Sikh Regiment and launched no less than 8 attacks on their post. The Indian troops fought fiercely, and Lance Naik Singh went around helping his troops and battling the enemy.

enemy with his grenades. He went on to fight despite being advised evacuation to hospital. During the fifth enemy attack, he fought hand to hand with two enemies and bayoneted them to death. His actions inspired his men and demoralized the enemy. Finally, they fought off the last attack on the night of 13<sup>th</sup>Oct. The Sikh regiment had lost 15 men while the enemy forces lost nearly 300. The enemy could not capture a single bunker.

For his absolute bravery and disregard for his own life, Lance Naik Karam Singh was awarded the revered "Param Vir Chakra." He was the first non-posthumous recipient of this award. His bravery and leadership saved the coveted position of Tithwal and inevitably changed the course of the war. He became the only Indian to receive the highest gallantry award from both Indian and British governments.

He retired from the army as Subedar and Honorary Captain and left for his heavenly abode due to natural causes on 20<sup>th</sup> Jun 1993 at the age of 77. Hony Capt Karam Singh is still remembered today as the 'Sardar', the leader, the man of steel. He will go down in the history as one of the greatest soldiers of India and will continue to inspire future generations.

### SUBEDAR JOGINDER SINGH, PVC

Subedar Joginder Singh was born on 26" September 1921 in Mahakalan village in Moga district of Punjab. Son of Shri Sher Singh Saini and Bibi Krishnan Kaur, Sub Joginder Singh did his primary education in his village. He could not continue his studies further as his parents could not afford it. He joined the British Army on 28 Sep 1936 and was recruited into 1 Sikh of the famed Sikh Regiment known for its courageous soldiers and numerous battle honours.

As a young soldier, he participated in World War II on the Burma front and then also took part in Indo-Pak war of 1947-48 in Srinagar. He married Bibi Gurdyal Kaur Banga, from village Kothay Rara Singh near Kot Kapura. The couple had a son and two daughters.

Indo-China War: 23 Oct 1962

A fierce battle was fought at Tongpen La, near Bum La, Tawang in 1962. This area earlier known as the North East Frontier Agency (NEFA) is now in the state of Arunachal Pradesh. As the war with China became imminent, 1 Sikh regiment was also called in from Jaipur. It was an arduous journey for the soldiers; crossing the jungles to Tenga valley, winding paths of Bomdila and a climb down to Dirang, to the frozen Sela lake and finally to Tawang. Sub Joginder Singh was the platoon in-charge and was a strong man with steely resolve. He was highly respected in the battalion for his discipline and exemplary fighting skills which he had shown during the World War II and the 1947-48 war with Pakistan.

Sub Joginder Singh's platoon was positioned on a ridge in the Tongpeng La area on the Bum La axis in Tawang. On 20 Oct 1962, the Chinese attacked the Indian post at Namka Chu that was under 7Infantry Brigade. Equipped with superior arms and ammunition and having readied for the war for close to three years, they easily overran the Indian troops and made way to Tawang where Sub Joginder Singh and his men had established their post. The Chinese soldiers began to collect at the other bank of the stream and to dig trenches. The attack on Sub Joginder Singh's post became imminent and he prepared his troops for the fateful day.

It was on 23 October 1962 at 0530 AM, when the kitchen was making tea for the soldiers, the Chinese decided to attack the Tawang post. Sub Joginder Singh's platoon of 1 Sikh stood ready for the counterattack.

They fought fiercely and the enemy was taken aback with many casualties on their side. However, in no time the enemy had unleashed another attack with more energy and troops. The battlefield resounded with the war cry, "Jo bole so nihaal, Sat Sri Akaal". Sub Joginder Singh handled the counterattack on Chinese with courage and patience. He knew there were very few soldiers on his side and arms and ammunition were scarce. In this situation, it was more important for him to keep the morale of his soldiers high. He motivated them to prove themselves as worthy soldiers of their motherland.

The final wave of the Chinese attack was more forceful and by that time Sub Joginder Singh had lost most of his men and was badly injured too. But he continued his attack by manning a light machine gun and killing enemy troops. When the ammunition with the platoon was exhausted, in a rare display of courage, Sub Joginder Singh and his men emerged from their bunkers with bayonets fixed on their guns, shouting the Sikh battle cry. They fell upon the advancing Chinese and bayoneted many to death.

Finally, better weapons and numerical superiority of the Chinese prevailed; and Sub Joginder Singh was captured as a POW. Sub Joginder Singh led his men and fought with grit, energy, and dedication. He kept the fighting spirit of his men ignited till they fell, badly injured, covered under the blanket of snow.

Sub Joginder Singh was awarded the "Param Vir Chakra" for devotion to duty and inspiring leadership and bravery of highest order. As a mark of respect to the brave soldier, Chinese returned his ashes once they came to know about the PVC being awarded to him. Sub Joginder Singh has been immortalized in the nation's history for his outstanding act of valour and will remain one of the greatest soldiers the Indian Army has ever seen.




