4. All alumni would be trained for their SSB whenever they clear their CDSE/AFCAT examinations and receive dates for their SSB.

5. Handball has been introduced so that cadets can learn a new troop game.

6. Golf has been removed from the training curriculum.

7. Novices Boxing would be re-introduced with the 14th Course AFPI.

8. One martial art would be taught each year in order to enhance offensive spirit.

9. All alumni are always welcome at AFPI. I strongly believe in the adage coined by the Founder Director, "Once and AFPIan, always an AFPIan".

I take this opportunity to wish the Double First Course the Very Best in their Careers and in Life ahead. Stay focused always!_

Wishing you all the Best and God Speed.



THE OFFICERS



Maj Gen Ajay H. Chauhan, VSM Director General

Major General Ajay H. Chauhan, VSM was commissioned into the 4th Battalion of the Mechanised Infantry Regiment (1 SIKH) on 09 Jun 1984. He received the Presidential Colours for the Unit from the President of India and later commanded a company of same unit in Counter Insurgency Operations where he was wounded in an encounter with terrorists. He commanded the same unit as part of an Armoured Division. AsBrigadier he has commanded the only Main Battle Tank (MBT) ARJUN Brigade of the Indian Army.

He later commanded the Services

Selection Centre Central at Bhopal with its four SSBs.

A highly qualified officer, he has had multiple instructional tenures during service including as a Battalion Commander & Senior Instructor (Army) in National Defence Academy (NDA), Khadakwasla and thereafter in the Junior Command Wing at the Army War College, Mhow. As a Defence Institute of Psychological Research (DIPR) trained Interviewing Officer he has conducted interviews of a sizeable number of candidates as part of the Selection System. He is legally qualified both in Military and Civil Law and has done his MSc in Military Psychology, Post Graduate Diploma in Hospital Management and Post Graduate Diploma in Psychological Counselling. He was awarded the **Vishist Seva Medal** (**VSM**) for his work in the establishment of Jaisalmer Military Station and completion of the long pending trials of the *MBTARJUN Mark II*.

He took over the appointment of **Director General** in Maharaja Ranjit Singh AFPI on 11 Jul 2022.



Brig S Vijay Bhaskar, VrC Interviewing Officer

Brig S Vijay Bhaskar, VrC was commissioned into the 13th Battalion of the Jammu & Kashmir Rifles Regiment (JAK RIF) on 14 Dec 1985. He has served extensively in Jammu and Kashmir along the Line of Control as well as in Counter Insurgency Operations and in the Siachen Glacier. He has also seen Regimental service in Rajasthan, Sikkim and Manipur. He commanded a Rifle Company in 13 JAK RIF in the Kargil War (OP VIJAY), where he was awarded the **VIR CHAKRA**. He commanded the 13 JAK RIF in North East and in the United Nations Mission in


Ethiopia & Eritrea (UNMEE). He has also been Deputy Commander of a Brigade in the Andaman & Nicobar Islands.

As a Brigadier he commanded a Brigade in Semi Desert terrain in Rajasthan, and was Deputy GOC of a Counter Insurgency Force in Reasi, Jammu.

A highly qualified officer, he has been an Instructor as a Captain in the Indian Military Academy (IMA) and as a Brigadier was Deputy Commandant and Chief Instructor at the High Altitude Warfare School in Gulmarg (J & K). He has also been in staff appointments in the Desert Corps as a Lieutenant Colonel and in the Army Headquarters as a Colonel.

A trained Interviewing Officer from DIPR, he has served in Selection Centres in Bhopal, Allahabad and Bangalore and conducted over 3800 interviews of candidates for all entries in the Army as part of the Selection System. He has done his Masters in Business Administration from Faculty of Management Studies, Delhi University. Apart from Vir Chakra, he is also recipient of COAS Commendation Card, GOC-in-C Commendation Card (twice) and UNMEE Force Commander's Commendation Card.

He took over the appointment of **Interviewing Officer** in Maharaja Ranjit Singh AFPI on 11 Apr 2023.



Col Sunil Kumar Sharma is a 'Silver Medalist' from the Officers Training Academy, Chennai. In March 1989, the officer was commissioned in the 18th Battalion, The Mech Inf Regt. In his distinguished service of nearly three decades in varied inhospitable terrains, the officer took active part in Op Rakshak, Op Vijay and Op Parakram.

The officer is qualified Air Warfare Controller from College of Air Warfare, Hyderabad and has done his Commando Course from Belgaum. As part of Rashtriya Rifles, he was actively involved in anti-insurgency operations in Distt

Doda (J&K) and was an Instructor at CBS School, Rajouri

He did his Group Testing Officer (GTO) training from DIPR and served at Selection Centre East, Prayagraj. As a GTO, he assessed thousands of candidates and recommended a sizeable number of them to become officers in the Armed forces.

He trained at the prestigious National Remote Sensing Agency, Hyderabad and worked as a Satellite Image Analyst at Defence Imagery Processing and Analysis Centre (DIPAC). He commanded an NCC Battalion at Sagar (MP) wherein he was part of Core Selection team for Thal Sena Camp, Republic Day Camp and Prime Minister rally. He took PMR in 2017 and worked as a Dean and GTO mentor at Saarthi Institute for Career Excellence, Delhi. He is an avid sportsman, a Command handball player and a single handicap Golf player.

He took over the appointment of **Group Testing Officer** in Maharaja Ranjit Singh AFPI on 01 March 2023.

SSB Training of Alumni: Commencing Aug 2022, we re-introduced training of alumni for their SSB. Alumni Association. With the strength of the alumni of this Institute increasing yearly, a great many alumni spoke to the Director recommending the establishment of an Alumni Association. The same is being worked upon and the AFPI Alumni Association should soon see the light of day.

Cadet Training Wing: The brilliant idea of starting the Cadet Training Wing (CTW) was that of the Founder Director. With the CTW he visualized that by extending the training of the AFPI to various schools in Punjab, more and more youth would get attracted to the defence forces. The AFPI lectures were to be delivered in different schools by local officers and the AFPI staff, trained students (who had passed NDA Written on their own) for the SSB within the AFPI premises. The programme which started in 2019 was rudely interrupted by the Covid Pandemic. Government sanction for extension of the CTW programmes is still awaited. Notwithstanding, till date the CTW has trained 18 students in the SSB from different Schools. One student of General Gurnam Singh Public School Sangrur joined NDA-148. One more student of Punjab Public School Nabha, has presently cleared his SSB and is awaiting the merit list for NDA-151.

Expansion of AFPI: An additional 1.5 acres of land located just opposite the main gate of the Institute was allotted to the Institute by the Government of Punjab for the expansion of the Institute. The land was taken over and fenced in Mar 2023. Plans are afoot to move the car parking, the Group Obstacle Course and construct a volleyball and handball court outside.

Upgrades within AFPI: A few minor changes were made within the AFPI as under:

<u>Signing Off</u>. As we go to press, the Founder Director of Maharaja Ranjit Singh AFPI, the man who had worked closely with Sardar Parkash Singh Badal, has sent his Salute in the form of an article. The article follows....

SARDAR PARKASH SINGH BADAL THE MAN WHO CREATED AFPI



The sad news of the demise of Sardar Parkash Singh Badal has been received by the people of Punjab with great grief. Gone at 95 – but gone too soon. His vision, foresight, humility, ready wit and political acumen is something that the state needs always and forever. The void he leaves behind will be difficult to fill.

One of his greatest contributions to the people of Punjab was the creation of Maharaja Ranjit Singh Armed Forces Preparatory Institute followed a few years later by Mai Bhago Armed Forces Preparatory Institute.

In my capacity as the Director General AFPI I had the honour of working closely with him. Whenever he visited the institute, and he did that quite often, his first sentence to me invariably was "General Sahib assi ki sewa kar sakde haan"? (How can I be of service to you General?) That opening remark from a long serving Chief Minister was ever so humbling that we were always resolved to redouble our efforts to take AFPI to greater heights.

He did not believe in elaborate paperwork and long-drawn-out procedures to sanction projects. On one of his visits, I projected a requirement to set up a synthetic surface tennis court. He sanctioned it on the spot and with his ready wit he said "Je tussi kaho taan sange marmar da banwa dawange." (If you say so we shall make a marble surface tennis court.)

A few months later my tennis court was ready. My indoor shooting range was also cleared by him in a similar manner on a subsequent visit.

The story of how I got the swimming pool sanctioned is a little more elaborate. It was in a meeting of the Governing Body that I brought up the need for a swimming pool. The proposal was opposed tooth and nail by some of the members present due to its exorbitant cost. I defended the proposal with equal vigour and the discussion became somewhat heated. The Chief Minister realized that that both parties were not prepared to budge so he quickly intervened with a solution which no one could turn down. He said in his inimitable style "Tussi swimming pool banao. Je sarkar kol paisa na hoye taan main paliyo de doonga." (You get the pool made. If the government does not pay for it, I shall.) The bureaucratic objectors were instantly pacified. I got the pool. The government paid. All was well.

One particular meeting with him is etched in my memory. It was on the 5th of August 2011. AFPI was only a few months old. I was sitting in my office when I got a call from him saying that he was in Mohali and would like to visit the Institute. I quickly summoned the warden and told him that the CM would be visiting. I had barely finished passing my instructions when I heard a police siren announcing the arrival of the Chief Minister. I took the CM around the institute and then he sat down in my office and said "Tussi mera sapna pura kar dita". Those words were immensely satisfying to me. I then asked him if he would join the cadets for lunch in the dining hall. He readily agreed. After lunch he spoke to the boys and invited them all for dinner at his residence on the following day. He said that he had enjoyed our lunch so much that whenever he felt like having a good meal, he would drop in to dine with us. Such was his magnanimity.


He would ring me up early in the morning or sometimes late at night to check on how the cadets were doing and whether we required anything. I remember that in 2017 when electioneering was on in full swing and he was preoccupied with speeches at rallies he did not call for several weeks. The final day of campaigning is a particularly busy one for candidates as they try to get in as many rallies as possible. It was a huge surprise for me therefore when I got a call from the Chief Minister late at night on the final day of campaigning to check on the institute and get an update from me. I asked him how did he find the time to think of us on such a busy day and his reply was that it was because the cadets were always very close to his heart. As the years went by it became apparent to him that the AFPI model was a winning formula. He then asked me to work out plans for an institute for training of girls to join the armed forces. I initially evolved plans for a coeducational institute at the graduate level for entry into IMA / OTA / AFA. He wanted a more conservative approach in that the institute should be exclusively for girls. Thus, Mai Bhago AFPI came into being. On the inauguration he had me seated on the stage and in his speech, he got me to stand up and said that it was because of the success of Maharaja Ranjit Singh AFPI that the girls institute had been conceived. The idea was his but he wanted to give the credit to his subordinates always. The hallmark of a great leader.

Prior to the elections the Model Code of Conduct comes into play and no major works can be sanctioned by the government. Before this could happen, he called me to his office and told me to ask for whatever we wanted which he would sanction before the Code restrictions come into play. He said there is no telling which way the wind will blow after the votes are counted so we should give him our wish list so that he could do something about it while there was still time. There was never a 'No' from him to anything we asked.

I visited him soon after the elections in which his party had been routed by the Congress party. He spoke at length about various issues and what his vision was for AFPI. He said that he would like the Institute to be a truly 'world class' training academy. I assured him that we would spare no efforts in fulfilling this desire. AFPI, I said was a small sapling planted by him which was now a fruit bearing tree. I said that every June and December, when the passing out parades are held at various academies, the harvest would be in terms of the number of young men from Punjab becoming officers. The Achievers Gallery in AFPI is testimony to the bountiful harvest we have had every year. May these numbers continue to increase and multiply.

He was always very proud of AFPI and would mention us in practically every speech he made. All dignitaries who visited him were invariably asked if they had been to AFPI and if not, they were requested to visit us. Some VIPs he would bring to AFPI personally. Yuvraj Singh, the famous Indian cricketer, was one such visitor who was brought to AFPI by the Chief Minister personally. We had a wonderful evening with him which culminated in dinner in the Cadets mess.

We looked forward to his frequent visits because he always came with the attitude of helping us and not for catching us out on some failings. He would speak to the cadets with great joy and motivate them to work hard and realize their goals. The institutes he created for preparing boys and girls for joining the armed forces are now well established and reputed not only in the state but indeed in the entire country. Many states have tried to copy our model and emulate our success. This is an apt tribute to the vision of Sardar Parkash Singh Badal.

A TRIP AND AN INSPIRATION


Opportunities would come; you just need to look upon them.





Know, as my wrath is to subside, and I wonder to criticize


That may be for nothing – I got my cloth fetid dye, only then I realize.

Now I am able to announce, "I have turned to a giant from a dwarf.


